Where Corrales Institute's vision overlaps with others'

- The best aspect of **traditional schools** is the way that <u>learning takes place in a place of learning</u>—i.e., a physical campus that reflects learner's biological nature and nurtures a sense of community.
 - But whereas many schools are relatively sterile, rigid, utilitarian, box-like, and decontextualized, we envision learning
 parks to be beautiful, verdant, flexible, neighborhood-like, and reflective of the wider community.
- The best aspect of the **Free-Range Learning Movement** is its belief that <u>the purpose of learning is the development of the</u> <u>whole person</u>, including the physical, intellectual, spiritual, emotional, and interpersonal dimensions of human beings.
 - o But whereas Free-Range Learners often pursue this holistic development in dispersed, ad-hoc, and individualized ways, we believe that this goal will be best achieved within robust communal and place-centered structures.
- The best aspect of the **corporate-technocratic model** is its insistence that *learning is a life-long endeavor*.
 - But whereas this model's emphasis on scarcity, tracking, and individualism will merely extend to adults the worst aspects of traditional schooling, we seek to make the most enriching and joyful aspects of learning available to all.

Where Corrales Institute's vision is radically different

• We believe that <u>genuine education and genuine democracy are inextricable</u>. We envision learning parks that are maximally inclusive and publicly available, and which are collaborative created, maintained, and administered by the learners themselves—thereby allowing participants to learn the skills necessary for creating a more democratic society.
